## St Marys' VP says water tests 'success'

The vice-president and general manager for St Marys' Cement said the recent water testing done on site was a success.

John Moroz took umbrage with an August 14 article that appeared in the Halton Compass declaring the initial water tests as a 'huge flop'. "The title of article should have read 'St Marys water test a huge success'," Moroz said.

He specifically took exception to the notion that the hydrogeologists were unable to draw the amount of water needed, only pulling 10 litres-per-second, rather than the 50-litres-per-second allowed in their Permit To Take Water.

"I don't make those decisions (over the amount of water drawn)," Moroz told the Compass. "We have professionals who are known around North America who make decisions like that."

"But from my understanding, they only drew 10 litres-per-second intentionally," he Continued on page 5

said. "This was not a test of our Groundwater Recirculation System (GRS). This test was set up simply to determine the characteristics of the aquifer. Professional hydrogeologists and scientists determined the flow rate that was required to characterize the aquifer. The 50 litres-per-second referred to in the article is the maximum rate and may be required for other phases."

"In fact, my understanding is, due to the abnormally high volume of precipitation and the highly instrumented test, additional observations on the aquifer's characteristics were made."

He noted that, "all of the feedback that I'm getting from our professionals is that the tests went well - that they got what they were looking for in terms of results."

But he emphasized that the first test (of three allowed in the PTTW) was never meant to test their GRS equipment. "Subsequent phases of the program will evaluate the GRS."

He also took exception to the notion that one of the three wells set up by the professionals had failed - that its casing had cracked, rendering it unusable.

"We did have three wells set up, that much is correct," he said. "But we were only allowed to test from one of them. And I never heard anything from our professionals about the casing failing on any of them."

While the article also stated that St Marys was eager to do another water test before the winter and then the third and final test in the Spring, Moroz said that at this point absolutely no timetable has been set for the final two tests.

However, he did confirm that those tests would include GRS equipment testing.

"I think one of the biggest concerns we're getting from the local citizens (in Campbellville and Flamborough) is that our tests will impact their (private) well," he noted. "So far, I can say we have not received a complaint."

However, Flamborough Councillor Margaret McCarthy told the Compass that a resident in Stonebrook Estates had contacted her during the testing to say the MOE was trucking water into their community.

According to information the resident received from the company contracted to bring the water, Team Aquatic, the resident told McCarthy that "as a precaution, the MOE asked that our water be trucked in until tomorrow (August 1) to 'let the well settle before connecting them back up again'."
